Making Jesus Real

Catholic schools are inspired by Jesus with the aim to share His values in daily life. Making Jesus Real (MJR) is one way of doing that. At St Lawrence MJR is incorporated into our school community in a wide variety of ways and is aligned with our Religious Education programs.

Making Jesus Real is centred around the belief that we are the image of Jesus to all those people around us. We are His representatives, and our actions should reflect His values. Jesus also commented that we are part of his family and that the way we treat others should be reflective of this.



In Term One we go back to the basics of what MJR is all about at St Lawrence. It is a timely reminder that we all can 'Make Jesus Real' in the way we greet, treat and speak to one another each day. Every day I see children from Pre Kindy to Year 6 making Jesus Real by the way they greet, treat and speak to each other and the staff at St Lawrence. It always brings joy to my day, when I am greeted by children and asked how my day has been, or when a child opens the door for me and when I see children helping each other in the playground. At each assembly a child is selected for our MJR award and presented with a certificate and 'Lawry Bear' for exhibiting the qualities that Make Jesus Real in our school.

Catholic Schools of Excellence

Talk for Writing

We introduced the Talk for Writing program at St Lawrence two years ago. Students across all year levels are taught writing using the Talk for Writing approach. It is a program that was developed in the United Kingdom by Pie Corbett and has benefits for children across all ranges of abilities and backgrounds.

Talk for Writing allows students to orally learn the language needed for a particular topic or text, before reading it and recreating it in their own writing. It focuses on high level vocabulary and is also very hands on and interactive. Talk for Writing is a very engaging way of learning to write different text types.

The Talk for Writing approach enables children to read and write independently for a variety of audiences and purposes within different subjects. A key feature is that children internalise the language structures needed to write through 'talking the text', as well as close reading. The approach moves from dependence towards independence, with the teacher using shared and guided teaching to develop the ability in children to write creatively and powerfully.

There are several key phases of the Talk for Writing process, the stages enable children to imitate orally the language they need for a particular topic, before reading and analysing it, and then writing their own version. To engage the creative minds of our young writers, at the start of each new talk for writing process, they use a "hook" to give the writing context and provide the children with exciting new opportunities.

Pre-Primary

Ms Christensen, our Pre-Primary teacher is focusing on the story of the 3 Little Pigs in her Talk for Writing lessons. The children were so excited by the hook Mrs Christensen used to engage them. She built a pile of bricks outside the classroom with sticks on the floor and a bale of hay. She then pretended to the children that she had heard a scratching noise and an 'eeeeee' sound close by.

She asked the children what they thought it could be. The children explored ideas such as it could be a fairy, a princess or a truck cutting all the trees down. The hook worked its magic as the children were desperate to hear why the bricks, hay and sticks were in their playground. Mrs Staltari then read the abridged version of the 3 Little Pigs whilst Ms Christensen drew a story map. Following this the children followed the story map to orally tell the story together. The children could then reenact the story using costumes and props Ms Christensen and Mrs Staltari had organised in the Pre-Primary classroom. It was wonderful to see the children so engaged!

I think Ms Christensen has missed her calling, she could have easily been an actress, she was so believable as the Big Bad Wolf!




Affordable Sustainable Schools


To celebrate our diversity two incursions have been organised for that day the Aboriginal Dance Troupe and the African Drumming Company.
